February message 2020



Happy 115th birthday, fellow Rotarians and members of the family of Rotary! Much has changed in the world since 1905. Then, the global population was roughly 1.7 billion. Today, it is 7.7 billion. There were 5 telephones per 100 people in the United States 115 years ago. In 2020, it is estimated that 96 percent of the U.S. population has a cellphone — and both China and India have more than a billion cellphones in use.

In the 115 years since Rotary was founded, seemingly everything has changed except Rotary values. We began, and remain, committed to fellowship, integrity, diversity, service, and leadership. While our Service Above Self motto dates to 1911, the ethos behind those words had already been ingrained by Rotary's founders.

As the pace of change worldwide continues to accelerate, the need for Rotary service is greater than ever. It's one thing to read about service projects, quite another to see them in action and to see the grateful faces of people who have benefited from them. Rotary projects change lives and connect the world. And over the past year, I have seen some amazing Rotary projects in action.

Gay and I visited Japan's Fukushima prefecture last year. Few places in the world have had to deal with the kind of devastation that visited Fukushima in March 2011, when a tsunami touched off by an earthquake led to disaster at a nuclear power plant. But the story of Fukushima today is not one of destruction; it is one of hope and renewal. Rotary grants have helped improve access to medical and mental health care for victims of the disaster and reduced the isolation of these communities by sharing the experiences of people from other parts of

the world who have also recovered from disasters. Our grants have also helped to foster self-motivation and encourage sustainable long-term community recovery across the region.

In Shanghai, I learned about the Careers in Care program. This helps migrant workers fill the need for skilled professionals in elder care facilities. After taking a course, trainees receive certification to boost their employment prospects, while the care industry benefits from an expanded talent pool. Rotary projects like this are successful because they address a local need, and they have the potential to attract local government funding to sustain their impact.

And in Guatemala, Gay and I went to Sumpango. Global grants there provide mechanical cows to produce soy milk; an improved water distribution system; water filters; clean compost latrines; family gardens; support for income generation; and training in WASH and literacy programs. The food items sold there not only provide nutrition to women and children, but also create a source of income for local women.

In every area of focus, and in every part of the world, Rotary projects are improving lives and helping communities adapt in a time of rapid change. As we celebrate another great year for Rotary, let us rededicate ourselves to strengthening the connections that make our service so impactful. We will make lives better as Rotary Connects the World.

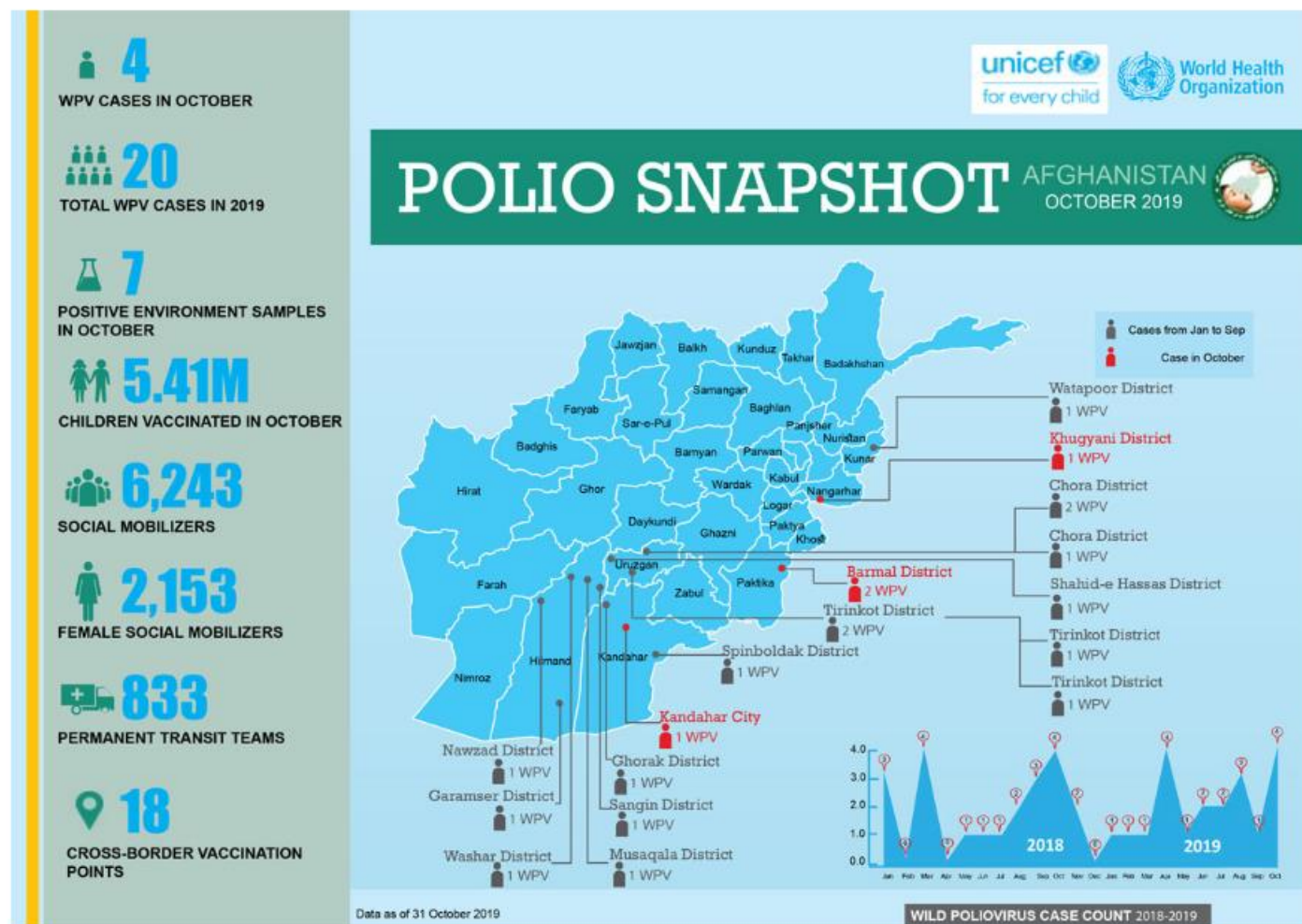

Update on polio eradication efforts in Afghanistan for October 2019



MEET ANIS, THE TAILOR WHO BECAME A POLIO ERADICATOR

In Kandahar, women polio workers open doors of hope.

Amidst the extreme heat of Kandahar City in southern Afghanistan, Anis Faizy, a 24 year-old polio outreach worker, moves with confidence between houses. Her aim is to talk to families that refuse to vaccinate their children against polio. Her energy is endless and she tops that with a smile and a warm way of talking with women and men.

For someone her age, Anis has an impressive range of skills. Initially a tailor, now she works as a skilled midwife with passion for her community. She is also a District Communications Officer for the polio programme, leading a team of 56 community outreach workers in her neighbourhood.

“I want to help my people – polio is a danger to every child, and we should eradicate it”, says Anis. When Anis started her job her father told her “You do what is best for you”, but neighbours in her socially conservative community were not impressed. She was told by others that she “could be killed while working in the community, it is unsafe for women, and women must stay at home.”

But social barriers didn't deter Anis, who has now been working to eradicate polio in Kandahar for over three years.

Anis recalls, “I faced tough refusal families who denied their children the polio vaccine. A woman refused to vaccinate her younger sister. After one year, the sister died of measles as she hadn't been vaccinated against it. Now, the same woman has a baby girl and she frequently takes her baby to the health centre for vaccination. Sadly, she learnt her lesson the hard way.”

Over the years, Anis progressed from the lower ranks of social mobiliser to become a supervisor. In September 2019, she applied for the position of District Communication Officer within the Immunization Communication Network supported by UNICEF.

In Kandahar, a male dominant community, women friends wondered if she would be able to supervise male teams. Undeterred, Anis won the job competition. The interview panel commended her achievements, including reducing the number of vaccine-hesitant families in her area, and her ability to drive others to promote vaccines effectively. Reflecting on her work now, Anis emphasizes, “I don't have a problem working with men. We help each other.”

Anis leaves her house at 6:30 a.m. during immunization campaigns, just as the sun breaks over Kandahar. She checks the outreach plans with her teams before they disperse around the town. Through the day, she makes supervisory visits to her teams and obtains updates on vaccine uptake issues. When she receives reports on absent and missing children, she converses with families in order to encourage them to vaccinate their children. To eradicate polio from Afghanistan, Anis thinks there is a lot more to do. She says, “we need better health and sanitation services, more women to access homes and better relationships with the local authorities to ensure families accept vaccine.”

“I will continue to work hard, for every child to be able to walk, attend school and grow healthy. It is the whole community cause for generations to come.”

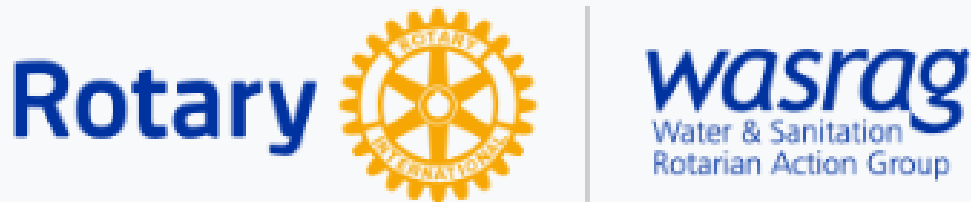

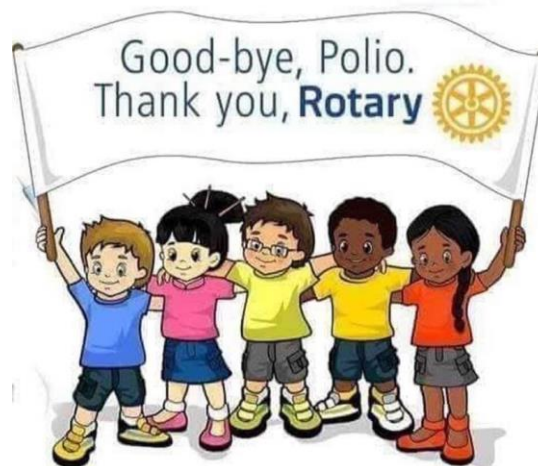

A Submission from Kurtis Lush

Some of you may know that I'm a member of Rotary, including the young-adult version Rotaract, in Sarnia.

About a year ago a few Rotaract members and I began discussing an idea to shovel driveways for seniors after snowfalls. Our original plan for winter 2020 was to go out after a snowstorm and go door-to-door to shovel the driveways of seniors for free. Nothing formal or official, it was just the idea of neighbours helping neighbours.

The idea began to spread over the winter, and eventually got the attention of some local agencies.

After a summer of planning with Age-Friendly Sarnia, Lambton Elderly Outreach, the City of Sarnia and Lambton Public Health, our idea became a program: ***The Sarnia-Lambton Adopt-a-Driveway***. The goal was to, with our limited resources, pilot a program which offered free snow removal services for 20 senior households in need throughout Sarnia. We aimed to have volunteers adopt 20 driveways for a winter. We wanted to see if a program like this could work and, potentially down the road, grow into something bigger.

Fast forward to last week, and I can honestly say, within a year, I never thought one small idea would garner enough attention and endorsement to turn into a community funded program. Last week the pilot received \$15,000.00 to assist in its maintenance and growth!

Thank you to The RBC Foundation and The Sarnia Community Foundation for believing in our idea to start bringing back the community spirit of neighbours helping neighbours after snow storms!

This weekend was our first snowfall out shoveling, and it was quite a memorable experience. We covered the driveways we aimed to cover and learned some valuable lessons to help grow the initiative.

Our biggest need though is volunteers. The demand for snow removal is high in Sarnia and the more volunteers that we can have commit to leading/helping driveways the more households we can assist.

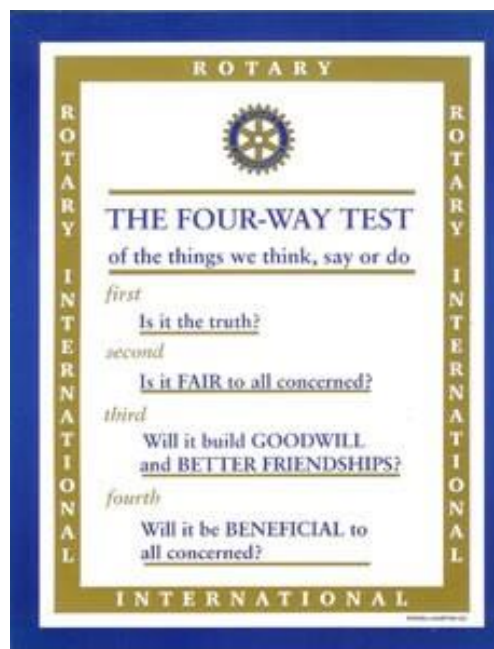

OBJECT OF ROTARY

The Object of Rotary is to encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

- 1. The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service;*
- 2. High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society;*
- 3. The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian's personal, business, and community life;*
- 4. The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the ideal of service.*



ROTARIAN CODE OF CONDUCT

As a Rotarian, I will:

5. Help maintain a harassment-free environment in Rotary meetings, events, and activities; report any suspected harassment; and help ensure non-retaliation to those individuals that report harassment
