November message 2019



Rotary Day at the United Nations, which we celebrate each November, is an important reminder of the historic relationship between our organizations. But this year's event is even more important than usual, because we are building up to the 75th anniversary of the signing of the UN Charter in June 2020.

You might ask, why celebrate this anniversary? For Rotary, it is entirely appropriate, because we played such a critical leadership role in the San Francisco Conference that formed the United Nations in 1945. Throughout World War II, Rotary published materials about the importance of forming such an organization to preserve world peace.

Not only did Rotary help influence the formation of the UN, but this magazine also played a leading part in communicating its ideals. Rotary educated members about plans to create the UN through numerous articles in *The Rotarian* and through a booklet titled *From Here On!* When the time came to write the UN charter, Rotary was one of 42 organizations the United States invited to serve as consultants to its delegation at the San Francisco Conference.

Each organization had seats for three representatives, so Rotary International's 11 representatives served in rotation. The people officially representing Rotary included the general secretary, the current and several past presidents, and the editor of *The Rotarian*. In addition, Rotarians from Africa, Asia, Australia, Europe, and North and South America served as members of or consultants to their own nations' delegations.

We have a deep and lasting relationship with the UN that deserves to be celebrated and appreciated. To recognize this relationship, Rotary will host five special events between now and June: Rotary Day at the UN in New York on the 9th of this month; three presidential conferences next year in Santiago, Chile, in Paris, and in Rome; and a final celebration just before the Rotary International Convention in Honolulu.

The focus on the UN in the year ahead is not only about the past; it also lights a path to our future. There are so many parallels between the work we do through our areas of focus and the work of the UN Sustainable Development Goals. While those goals are indeed incredibly ambitious, they provide inspiration and direction — and are similar to many Rotary goals, which have proven to create lasting, positive change in our world. The goals can be achieved, but only if undertaken with the same long-term commitment and tenacity that Rotary understands so well. Alone, we cannot provide clean water for all, we cannot eliminate hunger, we cannot eradicate polio. But together with partners like the United Nations, of course we can.

Please consider attending one of our five UN celebrations. I look forward to sharing news of these special events with you throughout the year.

Polio this week as of 30 October 2019

Summary of new viruses:

- Afghanistan — one wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1)
- Pakistan— one WPV1 case and 12 WPV1-positive environmental samples
- Central African Republic – three cVDPV2 cases and one cVDPV2 positive environmental sample
- Angola— eleven cVDPV2 cases
- Philippines – one cVDPV2 case, one cVDPV1 and two cVDPV2 positive environmental samples

As you can see below, the fight against polio continues again this month to be a very challenging exercise.

MEET JUNAISA, A LITTLE GIRL WITH POLIO

Three-year-old Junaisa is the first child in the Philippines to contract polio since 2001. This is her story.

When we visited Junaisa in her relative's home in Lanao del Sur in the southern part of the Philippines, she was timid with a fever. Despite feeling under the weather, she was well-behaved and quietly clung to a jar of snacks.

Junaisa's mother, Salma, told us that the toddler is usually chatty when there are no visitors around. But Salma explained that Junaisa has gradually become frightened of people, especially those wearing white, ever since she was admitted to the hospital a few months back.

"Junaisa was healthy," shared Salma. "She was full of energy when she was walking."

The last time the three-year-old was able to stand up and walk on her own was in June. She stood up, used the chamber pot and fell down.

"A sample of her faeces was brought to Manila; they did everything. And then the pediatric doctor told us they'll call about the results," said Salma. "After around two months or over one month, that's when we found out. It was polio."

WHO DG: THANK YOU TO ALL WHO MADE WPV3-FREE WORLD POSSIBLE

DG calls for doubling of efforts to now finish all remaining poliovirus strains

My fellow Polio Eradicators,

October 24 was World Polio Day, a global awareness-raising day on the need to complete the job of polio eradication, and here at the World Health Organization (WHO) headquarters, it was my great honour to make a

truly phenomenal announcement: that wild poliovirus type 3 has been certified as globally eradicated, by the Global Commission for the Certification of Poliomyelitis Eradication.

This is the second of the three types of wild poliovirus to have been globally eradicated. Only wild poliovirus type 1 remains in circulation, in just two countries worldwide. Africa has not detected any wild poliovirus of any type since September 2016, and the entire African Region is eligible to be certified free of all wild poliovirus next June.

Global wild poliovirus type 3 eradication is a tremendous achievement and is an important milestone on the road to eradicate all poliovirus strains. This shows us that the tactics are working, as individual family lines of the virus are being successfully knocked out.

But the job is not finished until ALL strains of poliovirus are fully eradicated – and stay eradicated. We must achieve final success or face the consequences of renewed global resurgence of this ancient scourge. We must eradicate the remaining strains of WPV1 and also address the increasing circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus outbreaks, in particular in Africa.

And here too we are making strong inroads. New strategies are helping us reach the most vulnerable populations, particularly in the remaining reservoir areas. New tools, including a brand-new vaccine, are being developed, to ensure the long-term risk of vaccine-derived polioviruses can be comprehensively addressed.

But these tools and tactics only work if they are fully funded, and fully implemented.

And so today, on the day after this tremendous announcement, I really have two messages for you.

The first is a simple and whole-hearted ‘thank you’. Thank you for making a world free of wild poliovirus type 3 a reality. Thank you to all countries, to all donors, to all stakeholders, partners, advisory and oversight groups, policy makers, Rotarians. Most importantly, thank you to all communities, to all parents. To all frontline health workers. They are the real heroes of this achievement.

And my second message is: please do not stop now. The Reaching the Last Mile Forum, hosted in the United Arab Emirates this November by His Highness Sheikh Mohamed bin Zayed Al Nahyan, Crown Prince of the Emirate of Abu Dhabi, will provide an opportunity for many of our stakeholders to recommit their efforts to a polio-free world. I urge all of you to stay committed and redouble determination in this final push to the finish line.

Together, the partners of the Global Polio Eradication Initiative (GPEI) – WHO, Rotary International, the US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, UNICEF, the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and Gavi, the Vaccine Alliance – stand ready to support this global effort. But it will take collective and global collaboration, from all public- and private-sector stakeholders, to ensure every last child is reached and protected from all polioviruses.

Together, let us achieve history: let us ensure that no child anywhere will ever again be paralysed by any poliovirus.

Club Tackles Panama Project

Club Member of the Year Tackles Project in Panama

Dan Heffron was named 2019 Rotarian of the Year of the Rotary Club of New Richmond, WI, for among other service activities, for coordinating a Rotary Project to construct a washroom in a small school in rural Panama.

The indigenous Ngobe-Bugle tribe suffer from extreme poverty and the importance of clean water, sanitation, and hygiene are not part of their culture or education to their young people.

Making a Difference in Panama

Bahia Roja is on Isla Bastimentos in the Region of Bocas del Toro, Panama. Bahia Roja is a small indigenous community of 100 people inhabited by the Ngobe-Bugle tribe, considered to be one of the most impoverished of all indigenous people in Panama, with an estimated 90% living in extreme poverty. Sanitary bathrooms and clean water are major challenges in small, more rural communities across Panama. The school in Bahia Roja only has one marginally-working toilet that serves more than 40 children from first through sixth grade.



The primary project would consist of constructing an additional bathroom for the school. The project would be completed over the course of one week in the fall of 2019. The bathroom would have a cement base, wood siding, and a zinc roof. Included would be a septic tank, water tank, and gutters to catch the water. The water tank would be raised in order to use gravity to be able to flush the toilet. Beyond the physical construction of

the bathroom, another closely related component of the project would be to educate the community about the importance of clean water and toilets, which are traditionally not part of their culture.

Even under the best of conditions, accessing school can be challenging and daily attendance can be inconsistent, thus it's critical to make the learning environment as appealing as possible to maximize learning and retain students. While the new bathroom can improve the physical sanitary conditions at the school, it can indirectly have an impact on retention rates and academic performance. Only 18 per cent of NGobe



students are educated beyond a sixth-grade level, and the overall literacy rate is 55 per cent, which jeopardizes future employment opportunities.

Providing better water, sanitation, and hygiene services in schools reduce hygiene-related diseases and can reduce the number of school days missed. It also protects girls' right to education, as girls may be more reluctant to continue their schooling when toilets and washing facilities are not private, unsafe, unsanitary, or simply not available.

Over the past week, we had multiple events. We

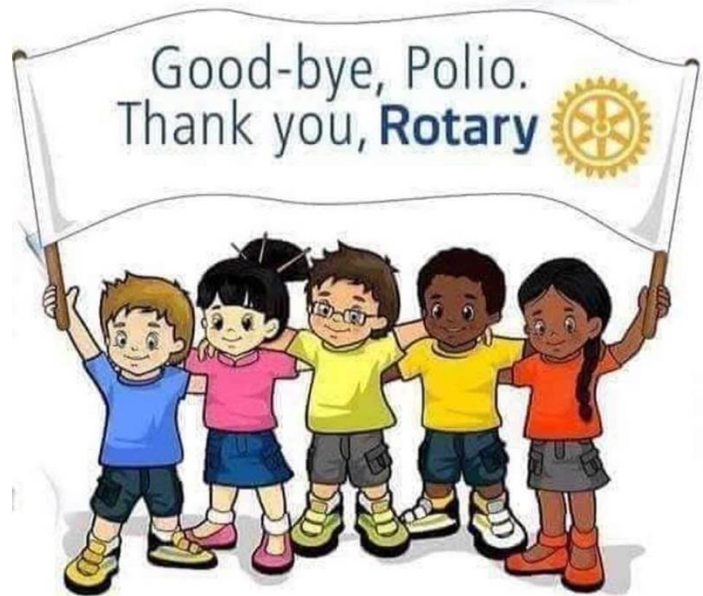
- Held several ***Dare to Dream*** movie parties around the District

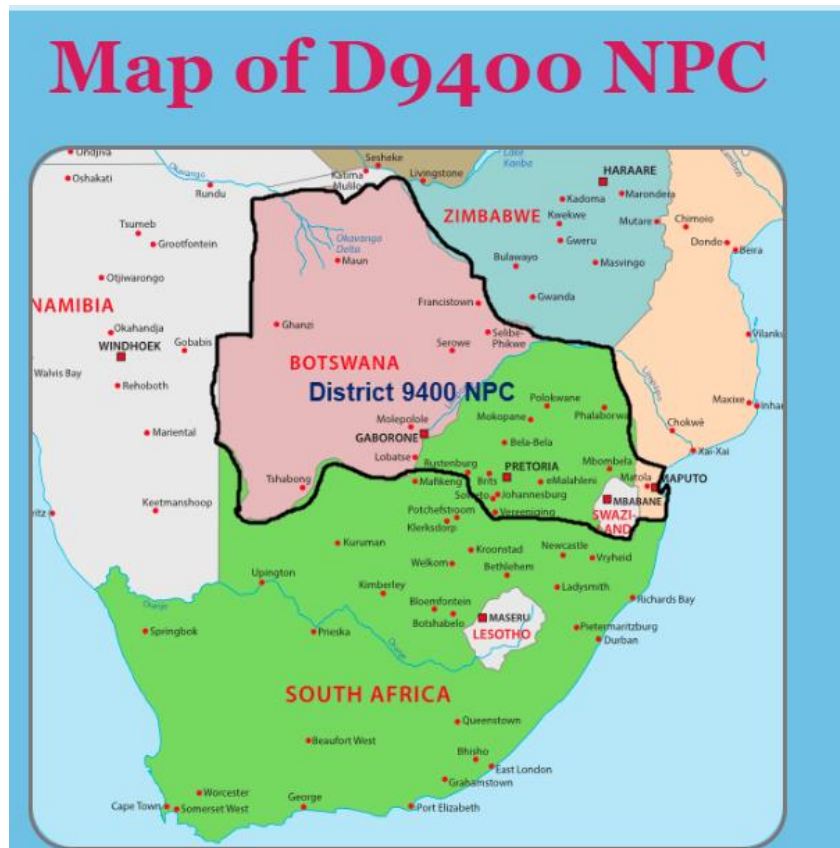

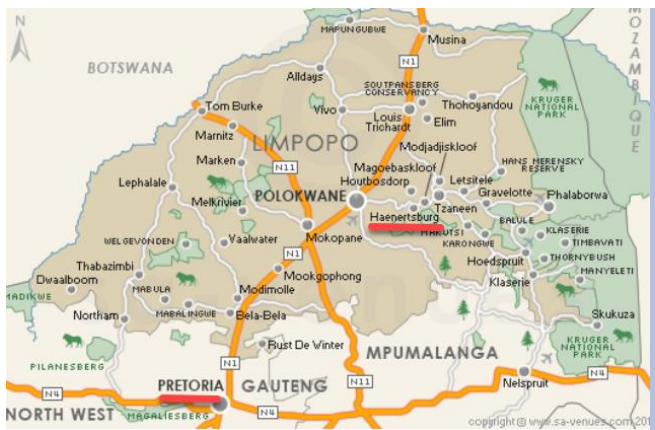

In Part 2 of the Netflix documentary series Inside Bill's Brain, the director notes that my analytical approach to my job isn't particularly inspiring. He's got a point. I describe what I do as "optimization"—a wonky way of saying I try to make sure our limited resources help as many people as possible. I'll never be the intrepid health worker on the front lines fighting disease. But if our foundation and its partners can help that worker reach more children with better tools, we all can create better lives for generations to come. Our decision to fight polio is one of the best examples.
